#### Fire Department Markers: Time to Update

The next time you are driving up the canyon, look for the green address markers. These markers are required by the County and are meant to aid emergency responders in finding residences.

When we get a dispatch to respond to an emergency at a home, it is rare for the residents to be named in the dispatch: almost always we just get an address. Even those of us who have lived in the District for some time can't match residents with addresses from memory. Mailboxes are of some help but mailbox addresses are often difficult to see and the grouping of boxes makes a poor indicator to where the house actually is located. In short, we rely on the markers to help us find a home and, as you will conclude from your up-canyon survey, the markers are in a generally crummy state of repair. The situation is even worse heading down-canyon as many of the green address markers are oriented for viewing when heading west. Imagine trying to find an address at night using the markers as a guide. Furthermore, the addresses on the markers are oriented vertically and are not reflective, making them difficult to read quickly under any circumstances. Imagine, too, the difficulty and confusion for our mutual aid emergency partners in finding an address. When seconds can count, time spent looking for an address can mean the difference between life and death.

It is time to update the markers.

Over the next few months we will be initiating a program to replace the markers with new ones that are oriented horizontally and easily visible from responding emergency vehicles. This will take a while to organize, and in-

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stallation details have yet to be determined.

A 'trunk' driveway with multiple homes will have a cluster of markers at the entrance; each time the driveway splits a new set of markers will indicate the homes down that driveway segment. Additionally, we plan to color code the markers to indicate the type of emergency vehicle that can access the address. In this way, responders will immediately know

#### Chief's Message

Several people have been asking about the new old fire station. We call it Station #1. If you drive by it every day you are aware that it has been sitting vacant and incomplete for many months. No work has been done on the station because Boulder County changed their mind about our septic requirement and, rather than grandfather-in our old system, they are requiring us to build a completely new system. Of course that requires money and it looks like our insurance company might pay for it. But first they need to know what it will cost. This is where the problems begin.

After five years of dealing with Boulder Land Use and Boulder Health, I am pretty used to watching projects take erratic unpredictable paths before completion.

Boulder County seems to have this method whereby they say no to everything, unless you can prove that it would be okay for them to say yes. That means the only people who can get anything accomplished in the county must have the resources to hire engineers, lawyers, et al, to petition the county with the tools the county pays attention to. In our case, the county will not tell us what standards we have to meet to put in a safe septic system. They require us to design a system and submit it for their approval. If they don't like it they will say no (again) and we have to design another one. This is actually a very disingenuous system because it leaves the community with the impression there is a high standard for compliance, when in actuality there is no standard at all. You can develop your own plan, with your own experts and get the county to agree to anything... if you have the patience of a saint and the money of sultan.

A good example is the Bernardi Flood Plain debacle in Eldorado Canyon. The flood plain map the county uses was thrown out the window when the property owners supplied their own map. Never mind that all the other surrounding property owners were held to a different standard. So our insurance company wants to know a price before agreeing to pay (reasonable). But our contractor can't supply a bid until the county approves a plan. Since the county changes their mind about almost everything, they might not approve our plan, and that would change the price.

The Health Department threw us another curve when, in the middle of the process, they decided we need an easement to legally locate the septic system where we want. You are probably not aware that the property Station #1 occupies actually belongs to the Sunshine Cemetery Association. The building belongs to the fire department, but the land was gifted to the Cemetery Association back in 1969. In order for us to dig a ditch and put a pipe in it, we have to get a legal easement from the Cemetery Assoc. We didn't need an easement for the old system. We didn't even need an easement to build the building. Either time. And of course, the Health Department is not willing to review our plan until the easement is complete.



The Health Department has provided a simple form to facilitate the necessary easement. Fill out the form, have a couple people sign it and turn it back in. But the Sunshine Cemetery Association, being somewhat picky about details like this, has asked for a legal review first.

So Station #1 sits idly by, waiting for someone to finish the job. If I were to guess I would say the easement will take another few weeks. Health Department approval will add a couple more weeks. The insurance company needs to review the costs, and IF they approve the project it will take the septic guys at least two more weeks to do the work. Then, and only then, will we be able to re-start work on the project.

On February 9th it will be two years since our station burned. I hope we have a garage door on by then.

#### Community Wildfire Protection Plan

Fire... we in the Sunshine Fire Protection District live with the threat of it daily. Like many of the fire protection districts adjacent to ours, several Sunshine neighborhood volunteers have been working together to establish a Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CW-PP) that will not only identify high risk areas of our community, it will provide data analysis and plans of action to mitigate those most vulnerable sections. What's more, this plan will be the document necessary for our community to apply for grant money, helping us offset expenses like building shaded fuel breaks, widening roads, felling and trimming trees, etc.

Beginning September 17, a neighborhood team of data collectors will be dispatched to each and every neighborhood within the Sunshine Fire Protection District. You may see one sauntering down your driveway, clipboard in hand, checking a list of questions that include, but are not limited to:

• What type of roofing material do the homes in your area have (shake shingles, concrete, tile, or metal)?

• Is there defensible space around each home? (This is often the most effective first line of defense in the event of a

• If there is decking on the home, what is it made of?

wildfire).

All of these questions and more will be answered by our data collectors and then, as a whole, our community will be analyzed by our fire-fighting experts, determining those pockets within the Sunshine Fire Protection District that pose the highest threat to structures, human and wild life.

You can identify our data collection crew by their red t-shirts with the word "Sunshine" written on the back in reflective lettering. If you see a volunteer, please feel free to stop him or her and ask questions. (See the list below for names of our volunteers).

Better yet, come to Fire Station #2 (5880 Sunshine Canyon Drive) at 9:30 Sunday morning, September 16, to hear a panel of experts explain the value and details of developing this CWPP. John Hilson (a former Sunshine neighbor and fire fighter now living in Gold Hill) will present a slideshow and discuss the inevitable risk to our forests as well as the benefits and limits of mitigating. Bob Bundy, Boulder's Coordinator for Colorado's Forest Service, John Chapman, Wildfire Planning Outreach Coordinator, and Eric Philips, Wildfire Mitigation Coordinator for Boulder County also will bring their expert knowledge to our meeting, rounding out the features of a CWPP, and addressing your questions and concerns.

During this meeting, we also want to hear from you. Where do you see potential danger in your neighborhood? What is it? And how do you think the situation can be remedied?

In Sunshine style, Team Sunshine will provide coffee and breakfast nibbles.

#### Sunshine CWPP Receives Expert Assistance

I want to congratulate a group of Sunshine Community residents who are working with Boulder County and the Colorado State Forest Service to complete a Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP) for the Sunshine area. The plan will analyze the community in terms of fire behavior and assess property risk, and set projects and priorities for needed fuels mitigation projects. It will also serve as an educational document for home owners to look at their own properties and consider actions which will help alleviate damage from wildfire.

I am John Chapman, the Community Wildland Fire Planning Coordinator with the Southern Rockies Conservation Alliance, an alliance of Colorado conservation groups interested in partnering with Colorado's mountain communities for effective, long term community and forest management. I am a team member of the Sunshine community effort, and am also working with six other Colorado areas to develop these important plans for the future.

Approved CWPPs enable communities to establish a long term planning and action approach to the management and health of the landscapes that make places such as Sunshine special places in which to live. Communities with approved CWPPs are eligible to receive grant funding to carry out needed fuels mitigation projects such as roadside clearing and community fuel breaks.

Community Wildfire Protection Plans are authorized by the Healthy Forests Restoration Act (HFRA) of 2003. Residential growth has mushroomed in for-

ested areas of the country where communities spring up on private lands surrounded by county, state and federal lands, the wildlandurban interface (WUI). It is recognized that federal and local fire fighting agencies and departments cannot provide total protection when large scale events occur.

For communities completing a CWPP, the HFRA emphasizes the need for federal agencies to work collaboratively with communities in developing hazardous fuel reduction projects, and places priority on treatment areas identified by communities themselves in a CW-PP. This provides communities with a tremendous opportunity to influence where and how federal agencies implement fuel reduction projects on federal land, as well as how additional federal funds may be distributed for projects on nonfederal lands.

Your Sunshine group has met over two months with myself and expert assistance from Bob Bundy, Wildfire Mitigation Forester with the Colorado State Forest Service, and Eric Philips, Fire Mitigation Officer for Boulder County. The group has organized themselves into topic areas for the planning effort and is well along in gathering information and planning to perform on-site risk assessments of the community.

CWPPs deal with community definition and mapping, fire history and expected fire behavior, assess-

ment of risk to properties and other values at risk (historic and recreational sites, sensitive species, etc.), establishment of community hazardous fuel reduction priorities and other mitigation options, development of an assessment strategy and an action plan, and education of community home owners on actions they can take to protect their lives and homes.

The CWPP should be a true community effort as it will be the community that carries it forward into the future and makes it a success. The team is going to host a public information meeting on Sunday, September 16, at 9:30am, at Fire Station #2 (5880 Sunshine Canyon Drive) with coffee and morning eats, so you can better understand the effort and what it brings to protecting life, safety and your community's homes.

Members of your planning team will be on hand as will the state and county representatives. There will be information available on creating defensible space around homes and protecting the homes themselves. You will see it is not necessary to clear cut the trees on your property to protect the place you love. The measures you can take are reasonable and help achieve sound forest management.

Your input is valuable to help the core team develop and prioritize the fuels mitigation and protection efforts for your community. I hope to see you there!

Volunteer Profile: Ene Beresford First off, our newest volunteer isn't Amy nor Annie, she's Ene (pronounced like "a knee" with the emphasis on the hard a), a name bestowed by her Dutch family who emigrated to Australia. The youngest of nine, she grew up in a hilly coastal area of Oz on a farm where hard work, self-reliance, and making do with less weren't valued, they were expected. All of which makes her a perfect fit for our fire department.

Before coming to Sunshine though, she made a few detours. She reversed her family's journey and returned to Europe to find her fortune, landing in Belgium for her 21<sup>st</sup> birthday and living there for over four years. Belgium has a very international outlook and there she worked for a start up company based in Antwerp, with an Israeli management, shipping to Australia. She loved everything about her time there and it planted seeds for her future life of global commerce, travel, and entrepreneurship.

For personal reasons, she reluctantly returned to Australia and to Canberra, which she describes as "the end of the earth, practically the bush" and took any jobs that could pay the rent, including working as a cosmetics consultant which was "painful but survivable". Finally, a newspaper ad led to a job at a young company in the paging business. That little ad catapulted her career and, best of all, got her out of the bush.

Happily transferring to Sydney, then Melbourne, then the eastern U.S., she grew in her job and the company took off. It was in Melbourne that she met Peter Beresford, who also traveled with the company to the U.S. (But they didn't get married then, that would be too easy and short a story, as you'll see.)

After that business was acquired, Ene invested in and worked for a call center business where she was the COO and ultimately in charge of a 2,000 person staff.

After leaving that company, her friendship of many years with Peter took a romantic turn, they became engaged and planned a large wedding in Australia. Anticipating wanting children, they met with an adoption agency to learn about the process. Ten minutes after leaving their office, they received a call asking if they wanted to adopt four-year old twins, and by the way they had ten days to decide and get married.

The answer was yes, their wedding was conducted at the adoption agency, and they went from "single" to "married with kids" in the blink of an eye.

Ene, Peter, and daughters Anna and Taisia lived for several years in Florida, enduring hurricanes and lawns with pink flamingos, before coming to their senses and moving to Sunshine. Chief Stratton quickly siezed upon Peter, enlisting him in the fire department, while wife Wanda worked on Ene. With both Wanda and Peter teaming up, she didn't stand a chance and agreed to volunteer.

She has no regrets and says that Peter

was right when he told her she would absolutely love it. She started by doing the wildland course and getting her red card, then moved on to structural fires including a burn building drill where, blindfolded, she had to find "dead" bodies.

Initially, she was concerned about being accepted in a male-dominated arena but says the guys have all been respectful, helpful, and treat her as an equal. In fact, she jokes that her biggest challenges have been remembering her left from her right (hard to cheat with notes when blindfolded) and learning that fire fighters don't like their PPE (personal protective equipment) referred to as "yellow costumes".

It had been several years since she had driven a standard transmission, so her first fire engine drives were somewhat humbling, including stalling out on the big hill and traffic having to be diverted and yet, Ene says, "Bruce Honeyman was incredibly patient and encouraging, a truly great teacher."

She also learned from watching the veterans who lean forward and really brace themselves when working the fire hose, which is like "holding onto a bucking horse".

With wonderful support from the department and an "awesome chief", Ene is glad of a chance to contribute to Sunshine ... that and she "gets to dress up in a yellow costume and hang out with guys".


